"Rop tu mo baile"!

This Celtic phrase translates as "Be Thou My Vision"...

These words were supposedly spoken by (saint) Patrick on Easter Sunday in ca. 433 A.D. The Irish High King of Tara, Logaire, had issued a decree that no one could light a fire before he did which would signal the beginning of the Druid Spring festival... Before this decree the "the converts to Patrick's teaching would light fires on Easter morning." Patrick, refusing to honor anyone but Christ, stood against the king. So that morning, he risked his life by climbing to the tallest hill in the area and lite a fire as before.

Logaire was so impressed with Patrick's devotion that he allowed Patrick to continue his 'missionary' work.

Prior to this, stories tell that Patrick was about sixteen when he was captured by Irish pirates from his home in Britain and taken as a <u>slave</u> to Ireland. He later wrote that he lived there for six years as an animal <u>herder</u> before escaping and with great hardship managed to return to his family in Britain. It is told that his father was a high church (Catholic) leader and Patrick also became a cleric. Feeling the need to preach to his former Celtic masters he returned to spread the story of Christ in northern and western Ireland. By the seventh century, he had already come to be revered as the patron saint of Ireland. However, it was not until 1912 that "Be Thou My Vision" was translated into English and not until 1919 that it was matched to the traditional Irish tune "Slane"... Appropriately, the tune "Slane" got its name from Slane Hill in Ireland, which is where Patrick lit a fire (candles?) on Easter morning in defiance of High King Logaire's decree against any other fire before his to celebrate not Easter, but the pagan Spring festival.

"Be Thou my vision, O Lord of my heart; naught be all else to me, save that Thou art.
